IRON WORKS TO CLOSE

Yokohama Firm to Start Dismissing Laborers Today.

All the houses owned by the Yokohama Iron Works have been sold to Mr. Jizaeon Takahama of Yokohama. The sale price was said to be ¥3,800.

KYOTO MAYOR MAY QUIT BECAUSE OF WELCOME GIVEN CROWN PRINCE

Considers Boisterous Ovation Regrettable And Wants to Assume Responsibility—Crown Prince Back Today.

Mayor Mabuchi of Kyoto will probably resign from his office taking upon himself all blame for the action of the Kyoto young men who forced their way into the premises of Omiya Palace there Sunday night in their enthusiastic ovation for the Crown Prince, according to the Asahi. Although His Highness enjoyed the scene immensely and insisted upon staying near the thousands of young men, who were boisterously giving banquets for him, the Mayor of Kyoto regards the incident as a very regrettable affair. He explained just how the event occurred at a meeting of the Municipal Assembly Monday and asked that he be allowed to assume full responsibility for it.

This in Japan signifies his intention to take the blame for the occurrence and rectify it as near as possible by surrendering his office. Mayor Mabuchi is said to have spent the entire night Sunday in the hospital there helping care for six persons who were maimed or less injured in the scuffle to get as near the Crown Prince as possible. The Crown Prince has completed his visits to the mausolea and will leave for Tokyo today, arriving at Tokyo Central Station at 6:30 o'clock this evening. Tomorrow he will act for the Emperor in receiving the credentials of the new Belgian Ambassador here. Following this he is to begin the series of receptions and banquets, which will extend over the week-end at his palace in Akasaka.
